Basic Internet Skills - Conducting Online Research

Objective:

To learn how to effectively use search engines to conduct research online, evaluate sources for credibility, and organize findings in an organized format.

Materials Needed:

- Computers or laptops with internet access
- Internet browsers (e.g., Google Chrome, Safari, etc.)
- Pre-selected research topics (e.g., a historical event, a scientific discovery, an animal)
- Research worksheet (includes space for writing findings, evaluating sources, and citing references)
- Citation guidelines (APA/MLA format)

Safety Precautions:

Project Procedures:

- Remind students to record the URLs of their sources and evaluate them for reliability.

4. Source Evaluation:

- Guide students in evaluating the credibility of their sources by checking the author, publication date, and website domain.
- Discuss how to spot fake news or unreliable websites and why it is important to verify information from multiple sources.

5. Organizing Findings:

• Students will organize their research into a clear, concise summary of key facts and information.

• They should list the websites or online articles they used as sources and include proper citations.

6. Citation and Final Presentation:

- Teach students how to cite their sources in a standard format (e.g., APA or MLA).
- Instruct students to present their findings in a written report or digital presentation (e.g., a Word document or a Google Slides presentation).
- Encourage students to use visuals (e.g., images, charts) to enhance their presentation.

Note:

Ensure students submit their research worksheets, citing at least three different sources for their topic.

Clean-up:

- After completing the project, students should close all tabs and ensure their devices are powered off properly.
- If working in pairs or groups, encourage students to clean up their shared workspace and return materials to the correct place.

Assessment:

- Review students' final presentations and research worksheets.
- Ensure they followed all the research steps, properly evaluated their sources, and provided proper citations.
- Assess their ability to find credible sources and the quality of their written research summary.
